ISSUE:	Whether a delegated Liquor & Gaming employee on behalf of the Independent Liquor & Gaming Authority (ILGA) should grant or refuse an application for an on premises liquor licence for a catering service class with sale on other premises authorisation.

ILGA DELEGATED DECISION – APPLICATION FOR A LIQUOR LICENCE

Fennel and Company Catering

Under delegation issued by the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority under section 13 of the *Gaming and Liquor Administration Act 2007*, a designated Public Service employee or other Public Service employee of Liquor & Gaming NSW in the Department of Industry, has decided to grant the application for an on-premises liquor licence with sale on other premises authorisation, application number APP-0004622609.

On 11 December 2018, and after careful consideration of the application and other material, the delegate decided to approve the application, subject to the following conditions:

Conditions imposed:

1. Section 11A of the Liquor Act 2007 applies to this licence. Liquor must not be sold by retail on the licensed premises for a continuous period of 6 hours between 04:00 AM and 10:00 AM during each consecutive period of 24 hours. The licensee must comply with this 6-hour closure period along with any other limits specified in the trading hours for this licence.
2. Consumption on premises (catering class)

Good Friday	Normal trading
Christmas Day	Normal trading
December 31st	Normal opening time until normal closing time or 2:00 AM on New Year's day, whichever is the latter
3. The licensee must not exercise the sale on other premises authorisation at locations/venues where there is already a current and valid liquor licence in force.
4. No drinks commonly referred to as shots, shooters, slammers and/or bombs that are designed to be consumed rapidly are to be sold or supplied pursuant to the licence.
5. Where the patron capacity of any given function/event exceeds 150, the licensee must:
 - a) Advise the relevant Local Area Command, local Council/consent authority and the Office of Liquor, Gaming and Racing of the event no later than 28 days prior to the event taking place.
 - b) Prepare a comprehensive Plan of Management and Security Management Plan in consultation with the Local Area Command that has jurisdiction over the area where the event will be held.
 - c) Provide a copy of the Plan of Management, Security Management Plan and any Local Licensing Agreements (where applicable) to the Local Area Commander.
6. The licensee must employ a fully licensed security guard at the ratio of 1:150 whenever the patron capacity of any given function/event exceeds 150.
7. The licensee must ensure an incident register (in a format approved by the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority) is maintained at all times to record incidents involving (but not limited to) intoxication, violence and anti-social behaviour.

STATEMENT OF REASONS

1. Material before the ILGA delegate

The decision made by the delegate had the application, the accompanying community impact statement (CIS-Category A) and other relevant material:

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- (1) Application form lodged on 03 October 2018 (DOC18/196284)
- (2) Plan of proposed licensed area (DOC18/196288)
- (3) Notice of Determination – Development Application DA2017/01333 dated 11 July 2018 (DOC18/196307)
- (4) Certification of Advertising (DOC18/230401)
- (5) A submission from the City of Newcastle Licensing Police dated 31 October 2018 has been forwarded with no objection but conditions have been requested to be imposed on the licence
- (6) A submission from the City of Newcastle Council dated 25 October 2018 which confirms that it has no objections to permit the proposed activity at the premises
- (7) Alcohol Plan of Management (DOC18/230465)
- (8) Notices (DOC18/196289)

2. Legislative framework, statutory objects and considerations

In determining the application, the delegate has considered relevant provisions of the Act, including the objects and considerations that are prescribed by section 3, which state:

3 Objects of Act

- (1) The objects of this Act are as follows:
 - (a) to regulate and control the sale, supply and consumption of liquor in a way that is consistent with the expectations, needs and aspirations of the community,
 - (b) to facilitate the balanced development, in the public interest, of the liquor industry, through a flexible and practical regulatory system with minimal formality and technicality,
 - (c) to contribute to the responsible development of related industries such as the live music, entertainment, tourism and hospitality industries.
- (2) In order to secure the objects of this Act, each person who exercises functions under this Act (including a licensee) is required to have due regard to the following:
 - (a) the need to minimise harm associated with misuse and abuse of liquor (including the harm arising from violence and other anti-social behaviour),

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- (b) the need to encourage responsible attitudes and practices towards the promotion, sale, supply, service and consumption of liquor,
- (c) the need to ensure that the sale, supply and consumption of liquor contributes to, and does not detract from, the amenity of community life.

3. Statutory tests

- (1) In determining an application for a licence, under section 45(3) of the *Liquor Act 2007*, the delegate must also be satisfied that:
 - a. the applicant is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates,
 - b. practices will be in place as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that liquor is sold, supplied or served responsibly on the premises and that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises and that those practices will remain in place, and
 - c. if development consent is required under the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* (or approval under Part 4 Division 4.1 or Part 5.1 of that Act is required), to use the premises for the purposes of the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates – that development consent or approval is in force.

4. Community impact test

- (1) Under section 48(5) of the *Liquor Act 2007*, the delegate must not grant a licence, authorisation or approval of a kind prescribed by section 48(2) of the Act unless the Authority is satisfied, having regards to the Community Impact Statement, where required, and any other matter the delegate is made aware of during the Application process, that the overall impact of the licence, authorisation or approval in question being granted will not be detrimental to the local or broader community.
- (2) The test applying under section 48(5) relates to delegated decisions in relation to:
 - a. the grant or removal of a small bar licence (where required),
 - b. a packaged liquor licence (limited to telephone/internet sales),
 - c. an application for extended trading hours to permit the sale of liquor after midnight in relation to a small bar (where required), an on premises relating to a restaurant that includes an application for a primary service authorisation, an on premises licence relating to a karaoke bar, a catering

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service or a vessel, and an application for a producer/wholesaler licence that includes an application for a drink on premises authorisation.

- (3) The Community Impact Statement provides the Authority with information about the views of relevant stakeholders and other aspects of the local community in which the proposed licensed premises is to be located. This includes, for example, the proximity of the licensed premises to hospitals or health facilities, nursing homes, schools and places of worship.
- (4) Local and Broader Community - for the purposes of this decision, the delegate is satisfied that the relevant "local community" is the community within the suburb of Hamilton, and the "broader community" of Newcastle City Council LGA.

5. Analysis of Submissions and other Materials

- (1) Having reviewed all of the material, I am satisfied that this application for an on-premises catering class with sale on other premises authorisation has appropriate Development Consent in place.
- (2) Council has no objections to the application.
- (3) I am satisfied that the applicant has provided consent to imposing the conditions contained in the licence document.
- (4) I am satisfied that the statutory advertising requirements have been met.

6. Overall social impact

(1) Positive benefits

The proposed licensed venue is a commercial kitchen with a catering service class and a sale on other premises authorisation. The venue only intends to provide catering off site for functions or events, predominantly wedding events for up to 300 patrons.

(2) Negative impacts

There have been no objections to the granting of this licence.

7. Conclusion

- (1) I am satisfied that procedural fairness was afforded to the applicant and interested parties regarding the decision whether or not to grant the application, as all of those required to be notified of the application were provided with the opportunity to make written submissions and all submissions received were considered and helped inform this decision.

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- (2) In accordance with section 45(3)(a) of the Act I am satisfied that the proposed licensee is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates.
- (3) Having considered the application and responses under section 45(3)(b) of the Act, I am satisfied that practices will be in place at the premises as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises, and that those practices will remain in place.
- (4) Consistent with section 45(3)(c) of the Act requiring development consent from the local council, I am satisfied that the required development consent or approval is in force.
- (5) In making this decision under delegation from of the Authority, all statutory objects and considerations prescribed by section 3 of the Act were considered and accordingly, I have determined to grant the liquor licence application with conditions.
