**ILGA DELEGATED DECISION – APPLICATION FOR
On-Premises liquor licence – Restaurant & Catering Service**

Vieux Group

Under delegation issued by the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority under section 13 of the *Gaming and Liquor Administration Act 2007*, a designated Public Service employee or other Public Service employee of Liquor & Gaming NSW in the Department of Industry, has decided to grant the application for an On-premises liquor licence (Restaurant & Catering Service), application number APP-0005719321.

On 12 July 2019 and after careful consideration of the application and other material, the delegate decided to approve the application, subject to the following conditions:



Conditions imposed:

1. Section 11A of the Liquor Act 2007 applies to this licence. Liquor must not be sold by retail on the licensed premises for a continuous period of 6 hours between 04:00 AM and 10:00 AM during each consecutive period of 24 hours. The licensee must comply with this 6-hour closure period along with any other limits specified in the trading hours for this licence.

2. Consumption on premises

Good Friday 12:00 noon - 10:00 PM (liquor can only be served with or ancillary to a meal in a dining area)

Christmas Day 12:00 noon - 10:00 PM (liquor can only be served with or ancillary to a meal in a dining area)

December 31st Normal opening time until normal closing time or 2:00 AM on New Year's Day, whichever is the later

Note: Trading is also allowed at other times on Good Friday and Christmas Day if authorised by an extended trading authorisation. Liquor can only be served with or ancillary to a meal in a dining area after 5:00 AM on Good Friday and Christmas Day.

3. Consumption on premises

Good Friday Normal trading

Christmas Day Normal trading

December 31st Normal opening time until normal closing time or 2:00 AM on New Year's Day, whichever is the later

STATEMENT OF REASONS

1. Material before the ILGA delegate (DF19/008218)

The decision made by the delegate had the application and other relevant material:

- (1) Application form lodged on 21 May 2019
- (2) Plan of proposed licensed area (restaurant/cafe)
- (3) Alcohol Management Plan
- (4) Certification of Advertising
- (5) DA approval for function centre, restaurant & cafe
- (6) Council & police submissions received with no objection

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- (7) Three public submissions received objecting to possible noise and parking issues – applicant replies that these factors were addressed in the development consent, that they value highly their good relationship with their neighbours and reiterate that the licence will primarily be used for the sale of matched wines with meals in their restaurant. Alcohol is only to be served as a convenience to their guests in moderation. Their target clientele is an older generation and they specifically do not permit birthday parties for persons under 30 or hens/bucks nights as they do not wish to tarnish their reputation. They also advise that they intend to stop the service of alcohol one (1) hour prior to the closure of the premises to the public.
- (8) Applicant's consent to conditions
- (9) ASIC for VEAUX GROUP PTY LTD
- (10) Notices

2. Legislative framework, statutory objects and considerations

In determining the application, the delegate has considered relevant provisions of the Act, including the objects and considerations that are prescribed by section 3, which state:

3 Objects of Act

- (1) The objects of this Act are as follows:
 - (a) to regulate and control the sale, supply and consumption of liquor in a way that is consistent with the expectations, needs and aspirations of the community,
 - (b) to facilitate the balanced development, in the public interest, of the liquor industry, through a flexible and practical regulatory system with minimal formality and technicality,
 - (c) to contribute to the responsible development of related industries such as the live music, entertainment, tourism and hospitality industries.
- (2) In order to secure the objects of this Act, each person who exercises functions under this Act (including a licensee) is required to have due regard to the following:
 - (a) the need to minimise harm associated with misuse and abuse of liquor (including the harm arising from violence and other anti-social behaviour),
 - (b) the need to encourage responsible attitudes and practices towards the promotion, sale, supply, service and consumption of liquor,

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- (c) the need to ensure that the sale, supply and consumption of liquor contributes to, and does not detract from, the amenity of community life.

3. Statutory tests

- (1) In determining an application for a licence, under section 45(3) of the *Liquor Act 2007*, the delegate must also be satisfied that:
 - a. the applicant is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates,
 - b. practices will be in place as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that liquor is sold, supplied or served responsibly on the premises and that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises and that those practices will remain in place, and
 - c. if development consent is required under the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* (or approval under Part 4 Division 4.1 or Part 5.1 of that Act is required), to use the premises for the purposes of the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates – that development consent or approval is in force.

4. Community impact test

- (1) Under section 48(5) of the *Liquor Act 2007*, the delegate must not grant a licence, authorisation or approval of a kind prescribed by section 48(2) of the Act unless the Authority is satisfied, having regards to the Community Impact Statement, where required, and any other matter the delegate is made aware of during the Application process, that the overall impact of the licence, authorisation or approval in question being granted will not be detrimental to the local or broader community.
- (2) The test applying under section 48(5) relates to delegated decisions in relation to:
 - a. the grant or removal of a small bar licence (where required),
 - b. a packaged liquor licence (limited to telephone/internet sales),
 - c. an application for extended trading hours to permit the sale of liquor after midnight in relation to a small bar (where required), an on premises relating to a restaurant that includes an application for a primary service authorisation, an on premises licence relating to a karaoke bar, a catering service or a vessel, and an application for a producer/wholesaler licence that includes an application for a drink on premises authorisation.

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- (3) The Community Impact Statement provides the Authority with information about the views of relevant stakeholders and other aspects of the local community in which the proposed licensed premises is to be located. This includes, for example, the proximity of the licensed premises to hospitals or health facilities, nursing homes, schools and places of worship.
- (4) Local and Broader Community - for the purposes of this decision, the delegate is satisfied that the relevant "local community" is the community within the town of Yass, and the "broader community" of Yass Valley Council LGA.

5. Analysis of Submissions and other Materials

- (1) Having reviewed all of the material, I am satisfied that this application for an On-premises liquor licence (Restaurant & Catering Service) is unlikely to result in any significant increase in alcohol-related harms in the local community.
- (2) Their target clientele is an older generation and they specifically do not permit birthday parties for persons under 30 or hens/bucks nights as they do not wish to tarnish their reputation.
- (3) The maximum capacity is limited to 100 patrons for functions and 60 patrons for the restaurant.
- (4) The proposed licensed area is a DA approved function centre, restaurant & cafe
- (5) Both Council and Police have confirmed that they have no objections to the licence.
- (6) I am satisfied that the applicant has provided consent to imposing the conditions contained in the licence document.
- (7) I am satisfied that the statutory advertising requirements have been met.

6. Overall social impact

(1) Positive benefits

The granting of the licence will enable a restaurant and catering service to supplement and enhance the services offered by matching wines with meals.

(2) Negative impacts

The nature of the licence sought means that there are unlikely to be any amenity impacts on the local community.

7. Conclusion

- (1) I am satisfied that procedural fairness was afforded to the applicant and interested parties regarding the decision whether or not to grant the application,

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as all of those required to be notified of the application were provided with the opportunity to make written submissions and all submissions received were considered and helped inform this decision.

- (2) In accordance with section 45(3)(a) of the Act I am satisfied that the proposed licensee is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates.
- (3) Having considered the venue management plan and related material, under section 45(3)(b) of the Act, I am satisfied that practices will be in place at the premises as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises, and that those practices will remain in place.
- (4) Consistent with section 45(3)(c) of the Act requiring development consent from the local council, I am satisfied that the required development consent or approval is in force.
- (5) In making this decision under delegation from of the Authority, all statutory objects and considerations prescribed by section 3 of the Act were considered and accordingly, I have determined to grant the liquor licence application with conditions.
