**ILGA DELEGATED DECISION – APPLICATION FOR
On-Premises Liquor Licence
Heyyou100 P/L t/as The Roast Office**

Under delegation issued by the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority under section 13 of the Gaming and Liquor Administration Act 2007, a designated Public Service employee or other Public Service employee of Liquor, Gaming & Racing in the Department of Customer Services has decided to grant the application for an on-premises liquor licence for restaurant and catering service, application number APP-0006387156

On 5 March 2020 and after careful consideration of the application and other material, the delegate decided to approve the application, subject to the following conditions:

Conditions imposed:

1. Section 11A of the Liquor Act 2007 applies to this licence. Liquor must not be sold by retail on the licensed premises for a continuous period of 6 hours between 04:00 AM and 10:00

AM during each consecutive period of 24 hours. The licensee must comply with this 6-hour closure period along with any other limits specified in the trading hours for this licence.

2. **Restricted trading & NYE – consumption on premises-restaurant class**

Good Friday	12:00 noon - 10:00 PM (liquor can only be served with or ancillary to a meal in a dining area)
Christmas Day	12:00 noon - 10:00 PM (liquor can only be served with or ancillary to a meal in a dining area)
December 31st	Normal opening time until normal closing time or 2:00 AM on New Year's Day, whichever is the later

Note: Trading is also allowed at other times on Good Friday and Christmas Day if authorised by an extended trading authorisation. Liquor can only be served with or ancillary to a meal in a dining area after 5:00 AM on Good Friday and Christmas Day.

3. **Restricted Trading & NYE Consumption on premises-catering service**

Good Friday	Normal trading
Christmas Day	Normal trading
December 31st	Normal opening time until normal closing time or 2:00 AM on New Year's Day, whichever is the later

STATEMENT OF REASONS

1. **Material before the ILGA delegate (DF19/16090)**

The decision made by the delegate having considered the application, and the following information:

- (1) Application form lodged on 08 October 2019
- (2) Plan of proposed licensed area
- (3) Certification of Advertising
- (4) An application for an approved manager approval has been lodged and granted.
- (5) CDC 15/122807/1 issued by the McKenzie Group, 3 March 2015 for change of use to a café.

- (6) Dee Why Licensing Police, 11 October 2019, have not objected to the application but have requested a suite of conditions to be imposed on the licence, if granted.
- (7) Several local objections have been received in relation to this application, with concerns raised regarding; lack of proper notification, potential noise issues, potential parking congestion around the venue lack of proper consent in place...The delegate has duly considered these objections prior to granting this liquor licence.
- (8) The applicant has forwarded a link to an on-line petition with 300 individuals in support of the application. A separate signed petition in favour of the application has also been forwarded.
- (9) Email correspondence from Liquor & Gaming NSW to the applicant, requesting additional information and consent to a suite of conditions to be imposed on the licence.
- (10) Email correspondence in response from the applicant and consent to conditions.
- (11) Evidence of completion of the relevant tiered industry training

2. Legislative framework, statutory objects and considerations

In determining the application, the delegate has considered relevant provisions of the Act, including the objects and considerations that are prescribed by section 3, which state:

3 Objects of Act

- (1) The objects of this Act are as follows:
 - (a) to regulate and control the sale, supply and consumption of liquor in a way that is consistent with the expectations, needs and aspirations of the community,
 - (b) to facilitate the balanced development, in the public interest, of the liquor industry, through a flexible and practical regulatory system with minimal formality and technicality,
 - (c) to contribute to the responsible development of related industries such as the live music, entertainment, tourism and hospitality industries.
- (2) In order to secure the objects of this Act, each person who exercises functions under this Act (including a licensee) is required to have due regard to the following:
 - (a) the need to minimise harm associated with misuse and abuse of liquor (including the harm arising from violence and other anti-social behaviour),

- (b) the need to encourage responsible attitudes and practices towards the promotion, sale, supply, service and consumption of liquor,
- (c) the need to ensure that the sale, supply and consumption of liquor contributes to, and does not detract from, the amenity of community life.

3. Statutory tests

- (1) In determining an application for a licence, under section 45(3) of the *Liquor Act 2007*, the delegate must also be satisfied that:
 - a. the applicant is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates,
 - b. practices will be in place as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that liquor is sold, supplied or served responsibly on the premises and that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises and that those practices will remain in place, and
 - c. if development consent is required under the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* (or approval under Part 4 Division 4.1 or Part 5.1 of that Act is required), to use the premises for the purposes of the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates – that development consent or approval is in force.
 - d. the proposed approved manager/licensee has completed the relevant tiered industry training as per legislative requirements.

4. Community impact test

- (1) Under section 48(5) of the *Liquor Act 2007*, the delegate must not grant a licence, authorisation or approval of a kind prescribed by section 48(2) of the Act unless the Authority is satisfied, having regards to the Community Impact Statement, where required, and any other matter the delegate is made aware of during the Application process, that the overall impact of the licence, authorisation or approval in question being granted will not be detrimental to the local or broader community.
- (2) The test applying under section 48(5) relates to delegated decisions in relation to:
 - a. the grant or removal of a small bar licence (where required),
 - b. a packaged liquor licence (limited to telephone/internet sales),
 - c. an application for extended trading hours to permit the sale of liquor after midnight in relation to a small bar (where required), an on premises relating to a restaurant that includes an application for a primary service

authorisation, an on premises licence relating to a karaoke bar, a catering service or a vessel, and an application for a producer/wholesaler licence that includes an application for a drink on premises authorisation.

- (3) The Community Impact Statement provides the Authority with information about the views of relevant stakeholders and other aspects of the local community in which the proposed licensed premises is to be located. This includes, for example, the proximity of the licensed premises to hospitals or health facilities, nursing homes, schools and places of worship.
- (4) Local and Broader Community - for the purposes of this decision, the delegate is satisfied that the relevant “local community” is the community within the suburb of Manly and the “broader community” of Northern Beaches Council

5. Analysis of Submissions and other Materials

- (1) Having reviewed all the material, I am satisfied that this application for an on-premises liquor licence for both restaurant and catering service is unlikely to result in any significant increase in alcohol-related harms in the local community.
- (2) I am satisfied that the applicant has provided consent to imposing the conditions contained in the licence document.
- (3) I am satisfied that the statutory advertising requirements have been met.
- (4) Development approval for the proposed premises use is in place.
- (5) I am satisfied that the proposed licensee has completed the relevant licensee/approved manager tiered industry training as per legislative requirements.
- (6) I have duly considered the points raised by several submissions received which object to the granting of this application in addition to two petitions listing signatures in favour of the liquor licence.
- (7) Both Police and Council have not objected to this application and although Police have requested a suite of conditions to be imposed, I have considered the fact that the proposed liquor trading hours will be reduced and that the venue is relatively small with a proposed patron capacity of 26, prior to determining this application.

6. Overall social impact

(1) Positive benefits

The applicant wishes to host small functions for private events in addition to community-based groups. The patron capacity is 26 with reduced liquor trading hours to 10:00 PM.

Negative impacts

The nature of the licence sought means that there are unlikely to be any amenity impacts on the local community. Although several objections have been received two signed petitions (one written, one on-line) with a large number of signatures have been forwarded in support of the grant of the licence.

7. Conclusion

- (1) I am satisfied that procedural fairness was afforded to the applicant and interested parties regarding the decision whether or not to grant the application, as all of those required to be notified of the application were provided with the opportunity to make written submissions and all submissions received were considered and helped inform this decision.
- (2) In accordance with section 45(3)(a) of the Act I am satisfied that the proposed licensee is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates.
- (3) Having considered the venue management plan and related material, under section 45(3)(b) of the Act, I am satisfied that practices will be in place at the premises as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises, and that those practices will remain in place.
- (4) Consistent with section 45(3)(c) of the Act requiring development consent from the local council, I am satisfied that the required development consent or approval is in force.
- (5) In making this decision under delegation from of the Authority, all statutory objects and considerations prescribed by section 3 of the Act were considered and accordingly, I have determined to grant the liquor licence application with conditions.
