**ILGA DELEGATED DECISION – APPLICATION FOR ON-PREMISES LIQUOR  
LICENCE WITH CATERING SERVICE**

**DUNES ON SHELLY BEACH PTY. LTD**

Under delegation issued by the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority under section 13 of the *Gaming and Liquor Administration Act 2007*, a designated Public Service employee or other Public Service employee of Liquor & Gaming NSW in the Department of Justice, has decided to grant the application for an on-premises liquor licence with catering service, 1-4400488182.

On 19 November 2016, and after careful consideration of the application and other material, the delegate decided to approve the application, subject to the following conditions:

**Conditions imposed:**

1. Section 11A of the Liquor Act 2007 applies to this licence. Liquor must not be sold by retail on the licensed premises for a continuous period of 6 hours between 04:00 AM and 10:00 AM during each consecutive period of 24 hours. The licensee must comply with this 6-hour closure period along with any other limits specified in the trading hours for this licence.

2. Consumption on premises

Good Friday	Normal trading
Christmas Day	Normal trading
December 31st	Normal opening time until normal closing time or 2:00 AM on New Year's Day, whichever is the later

3. The premises are to be operated at all times in accordance with the Plan of Management dated September 2016 as may be varied from time to time in consultation with the Local Area Commander.
4. The business of providing the catering service must be for fee, gain or reward. Functions held pursuant to the catering service must be pre-booked. A Catering Service booking register must be maintained.
5. No drinks commonly referred to as shots, shooters, slammers, and/or bombs are to be sold or supplied.
6. The licensee or its representative must be an active member of the Local Liquor Accord and must attend all general meetings as announced by the Liquor Accord.

## STATEMENT OF REASONS

### 1. Material before the ILGA delegate

The decision made by the delegate had the application and other relevant material:

- (3) Development consent, DA 2011/470, is in place for the proposed premises use as a conference centre (DOC16/044278)
- (4) Police submission dated 17 June 2016 which has requested that the applicant become a member of the Local Liquor Accord (DOC16/068135)
- (5) Council submission dated 14 April 2016 confirming that development consent, DA 2011/470, is in place.(DOC16/113120)
- (6) Premises plan of the proposed licensed area (DOC16/152347)
- (7) ASIC company report for the proposed licensee , DUNES ON SHELLY BEACH PTY LTD, forwarded 9 May 2016 (DOC16/044279)
- (8) Appointment of manager notice for Natasha McGarry, forwarded 13 July 2016 (DOC16/075763)
- (9) Premises photos which confirm that the venue is ready to trade, (DOC16/147810)
- (10) An email from Mr T Mannering on behalf of the applicant consenting to the imposition of the proposed conditions, received 16 November 2016 (DOC16/152339)

### 2. Legislative framework, statutory objects and considerations

In determining the application, the delegate has considered relevant provisions of the Act, including the objects and considerations that are prescribed by section 3, which state:

#### 3 Objects of Act

- (1) The objects of this Act are as follows:
  - (a) to regulate and control the sale, supply and consumption of liquor in a way that is consistent with the expectations, needs and aspirations of the community,
  - (b) to facilitate the balanced development, in the public interest, of the liquor industry, through a flexible and practical regulatory system with minimal formality and technicality,
  - (c) to contribute to the responsible development of related industries such as the live music, entertainment, tourism and hospitality industries.

- (2) In order to secure the objects of this Act, each person who exercises functions under this Act (including a licensee) is required to have due regard to the following:
- (a) the need to minimise harm associated with misuse and abuse of liquor (including the harm arising from violence and other anti-social behaviour),
  - (b) the need to encourage responsible attitudes and practices towards the promotion, sale, supply, service and consumption of liquor,
  - (c) the need to ensure that the sale, supply and consumption of liquor contributes to, and does not detract from, the amenity of community life.

### **3. Statutory tests**

- (1) In determining an application for a licence, under section 45(3) of the *Liquor Act 2007*, the delegate must also be satisfied that:
- a. the applicant is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates,
  - b. practices will be in place as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that liquor is sold, supplied or served responsibly on the premises and that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises and that those practices will remain in place, and
  - c. if development consent is required under the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* (or approval under part 3A or part 5.1 of that Act is required), to use the premises for the purposes of the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates – that development consent or approval is in force.

### **4. Analysis of Submissions and other Materials**

- (1) Having reviewed all of the material, I am satisfied that this application for an on-premises liquor licence is low risk.
- (2) The proposed licenced premises, with a catering class is a conference centre, specialising in conferences, weddings functions etc. with a patron capacity of 170.
- (3) A submission was received from Richmond LAC which requested the proposed licensee to become a member of the Local Liquor Accord..
- (4) The licence will be exercised in accordance with a detailed Plan of Management that details the location, hours of trade, signage requirements, storage of alcohol, responsible service of alcohol and delivery of alcohol.
- (5) I am satisfied that the statutory advertising requirements have been met.

## 5. Overall social impact

No public submissions have been received opposing the grant of the licence. A number of conditions have been imposed on the licence. The licence will be operated in accordance with harm minimisation measures outlined in the Plan of Management provided by the applicant.

## 6. Conclusion

- (1) I am satisfied that procedural fairness was afforded to the applicant and interested parties regarding the decision whether or not to grant the application, as all of those required to be notified of the application were provided with the opportunity to make written submissions and all submissions received were considered and helped inform this decision.
- (2) In accordance with section 45(3)(a) of the Act I am satisfied that the proposed licensee is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates.
- (3) Having considered the venue management plan and related material, under section 45(3)(b) of the Act, I am satisfied that practices will be in place at the premises as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises, and that those practices will remain in place.
- (4) Consistent with section 45(3)(c) of the Act requiring development consent from the local council, I am satisfied that the required development consent or approval is in force.
- (5) I am satisfied that the applicant has provided consent to imposing the conditions contained in the licence document.
- (6) In making this decision under delegation from of the Authority, all statutory objects and considerations prescribed by section 3 of the Act were considered and accordingly, I have determined to grant the on premises with catering class application with conditions.
