**ILGA DELEGATED DECISION – APPLICATION FOR
On Premises LIQUOR LICENCE Vessel**

Under delegation issued by the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority under section 13 of the *Gaming and Liquor Administration Act* 2007, a designated Public Service employee or other Public Service employee of Liquor & Gaming NSW in the Department of Industry, has decided to grant the application for a on premises liquor licence Vessel, application number APP-0003199864.

On 5 February 2018, and after careful consideration of the application and other material, the delegate decided to approve the application, subject to the following conditions:

Conditions imposed:

1. Section 11A of the *Liquor Act* 2007 applies to this licence. Liquor must not be sold by retail on the licensed premises for a continuous period of 6 hours between 02:00 AM and 08:00 AM during each consecutive period of 24 hours. The licensee must comply with

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this 6-hour closure period along with any other limits specified in the trading hours for this licence.

2. Alcohol is not to be provided unless food of a nature and quantity consistent with the responsible sale, supply and service of alcohol is made available whenever liquor is sold or supplied.
3. The licensee is authorised to sell liquor by retail to passengers on board the vessel, for consumption on board the vessel only between the period commencing one hour before the vessel starts any voyage or passage and ending 30 minutes after the voyage or passage is completed.
4. The licensee is to ensure that no drinks commonly referred to as shots, shooters or slammers etc are to be sold or supplied at the premises, this includes all drinks that are prepared to be consumed rapidly
5. The licensee is to ensure no patron is stockpiling drinks and that a single patron has no more than two unconsumed drinks at any one time that are for their consumption.
6. The licensee must ensure that all bar staff will wear clothing that clearly identifies them as Bar Staff and employees of the Licensee.

STATEMENT OF REASONS

1. Material before the ILGA delegate

The decision made by the delegate had the application, the accompanying community impact statement (CIS-Category A) and other relevant material:

- (1) Application form lodged 31st October 2017
- (2) A Plan of Management outlining practices of the business.
- (3) Certificate of Advertising dated 22 January 2018.
- (4) Plan of the proposed licensed area.
- (5) Current Certificate of survey for the vessel dated 1st November 2017.
- (6) Email correspondence from the Authority to the applicant acknowledging conditions, is February 2018.

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2. Legislative framework, statutory objects and considerations

In determining the application, the delegate has considered relevant provisions of the Act, including the objects and considerations that are prescribed by section 3, which state:

3 Objects of Act

- (1) The objects of this Act are as follows:
 - (a) to regulate and control the sale, supply and consumption of liquor in a way that is consistent with the expectations, needs and aspirations of the community,
 - (b) to facilitate the balanced development, in the public interest, of the liquor industry, through a flexible and practical regulatory system with minimal formality and technicality,
 - (c) to contribute to the responsible development of related industries such as the live music, entertainment, tourism and hospitality industries.
- (2) In order to secure the objects of this Act, each person who exercises functions under this Act (including a licensee) is required to have due regard to the following:
 - (a) the need to minimise harm associated with misuse and abuse of liquor (including the harm arising from violence and other anti-social behaviour),
 - (b) the need to encourage responsible attitudes and practices towards the promotion, sale, supply, service and consumption of liquor,
 - (c) the need to ensure that the sale, supply and consumption of liquor contributes to, and does not detract from, the amenity of community life.

3. Statutory tests

- (1) In determining an application for a licence, under section 45(3) of the *Liquor Act* 2007, the delegate must also be satisfied that:
 - a. the applicant is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates,
 - b. practices will be in place as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that liquor is sold, supplied or served responsibly on the premises and that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises and that those practices will remain in place, and
 - c. if development consent is required under the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act* 1979 (or approval under Part 4 Division 4.1 or Part 5.1 of that

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Act is required), to use the premises for the purposes of the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates – that development consent or approval is in force.

4. Community impact test

- (1) Under section 48(5) of the *Liquor Act 2007*, the delegate must not grant a licence, authorisation or approval of a kind prescribed by section 48(2) of the Act unless the Authority is satisfied, having regards to the Community Impact Statement, where required, and any other matter the delegate is made aware of during the Application process, that the overall impact of the licence, authorisation or approval in question being granted will not be detrimental to the local or broader community.
- (2) The test applying under section 48(5) relates to delegated decisions in relation to:
 - a. the grant or removal of a small bar licence (where required),
 - b. a packaged liquor licence (limited to telephone/internet sales),
 - c. an application for extended trading hours to permit the sale of liquor after midnight in relation to a small bar (where required), an on premises relating to a restaurant that includes an application for a primary service authorisation, an on premises licence relating to a karaoke bar, a catering service or a vessel, and an application for a producer/wholesaler licence that includes an application for a drink on premises authorisation.
- (3) The Community Impact Statement provides the Authority with information about the views of relevant stakeholders and other aspects of the local community in which the proposed licensed premises is to be located. This includes, for example, the proximity of the licensed premises to hospitals or health facilities, nursing homes, schools and places of worship.
- (4) Local and Broader Community - for the purposes of this decision, the delegate is satisfied that the relevant “local community” is the community within the suburb of Rosebay, and the “broader community” of the Woollahra Municipal Council LGA.

5. Analysis of Submissions and other Materials

- (1) Having reviewed all of the material, I am satisfied that this application for an online packaged liquor licence is unlikely to result in any significant increase in alcohol-related harms in the local community.
- (2) The sale of liquor will be limited to by means of taking orders over the telephone or by facsimile or mail order, or through an internet site.

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- (3) The proposed licensed premises comprises of an office, at which online orders will be received and processed.
- (4) The licence will be exercised in accordance with a Business plan that details the responsible service and delivery of alcohol.
- (5) A submission from the secretary to Liquor& gaming NSW raises no concerns.
- (6) I am satisfied that the applicant has provided consent to imposing the conditions contained in the licence document.
- (7) I am satisfied that the statutory advertising requirements have been met.

6. Overall social impact

(1) Positive benefits

The proposed licence will provide convenient facility for functions, catering engagements, weddings, birthday, harbour cruise by taking orders online, by phone, fax or mail order, and food will be provided at all times.

(2) Negative impacts

The nature of the licence sought means that there are unlikely to be any amenity impacts on the local community.

7. Conclusion

- (1) I am satisfied that procedural fairness was afforded to the applicant and interested parties regarding the decision whether or not to grant the application, as all of those required to be notified of the application were provided with the opportunity to make written submissions and all submissions received were considered and helped inform this decision.
- (2) In accordance with section 45(3)(a) of the Act I am satisfied that the proposed licensee is a fit and proper person to carry on the business or activity to which the proposed licence relates.
- (3) Having considered the venue management plan and related material, under section 45(3)(b) of the Act, I am satisfied that practices will be in place at the premises as soon as the licence is granted that ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent intoxication on the premises, and that those practices will remain in place.
- (4) Consistent with section 45(3)(c) of the Act requiring development consent from the local council, I am satisfied that the required development consent or approval is in force.



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- (5) In making this decision under delegation from of the Authority, all statutory objects and considerations prescribed by section 3 of the Act were considered and accordingly, I have determined to grant the liquor licence application with conditions.
