Musicians, promoters, bar tenders, managers, venue owners, graphic designers, security, transfer companies and limousine services, singers and songwriters, amongst other hard working people that I know personally are losing their jobs.

It's never been this hard.

Venues are closing at a dramatic rate.

When this happens, it's not only the direct workers involved that suffer but the culture overall and those behind the scenes.

The license fees that clubs pay toward companies like ARIA and APRA also disappear. Artists that sit at home, sober, are having their income cut so drastically because the income pool from establishments is just constantly depleting with each closure. This also goes for labels and the staff involved there.

Venue closures chip away at the culture of the Australian music scene overall.

I know that you'd have hundreds of opinions rolling in from both sides.

But the late night industry doesn't want the violence either.

There are fantastic people who understand the entertainment industry, who are trying to provide for their families.

But lately so many are falling into depression because they can't do that, most of whom are now looking to move overseas.

I've built a career for myself and so have so many close friends.

All that the industry wants, is the opportunity to continue to do so, with more thought being put in to a creative solution to solve the reasons behind individuals who spoil the happiness of others when they drink.

We want to keep working, we loved working in a thriving music industry.

Thousands of good Australians, both in NSW and in other states, are fighting to build good lives for themselves.

But we need more help from the government and authorities to be able to do so.

Please re-consider the current laws. They're hurting a lot of people.
