No, not really. It was a grossly inappropriate, unfair and poorly considered tactic for dealing with a few problematic individuals.

Alcohol was never the problem.

Hiding behind a term like "alcohol-fuelled violence" misleads the general public and allows for an ill-informed audience to get behind an ill-informed solution. Aggression is most often a deep-seated character trait that exists with or without the assistance of drugs (alcohol or otherwise).
