It's a ghost city where one has to move inside after 10pm, when one is merely having a drink at the small local down the street at Black Penny bar, especially frustrating when Sydney has the ideal weather for being outside. on the contrary Melbourne does all it can to defend its people against the weather and their right to sit outside, with blankets a regular feature in venues.

I rarely hear residents here complaining that the city has gotten too loud, too violent or too pissed, but rather, where is everybody and where can I grab a bite to eat after 9pm. Thankfully there is a constant trail of people huddled around Messina ice-cream, giving us hope that after all people want to be here, they just don't know where they might go.

I really do hope some life is going to be brought back in, why else live in one of the highest cost suburbs in Australia.
